



Blue-Green Toxic Algae "Phosphorus Overload Spawns Algae in Rivers and Lakes" Dispatch, March 6, 2011 -Phosphorus is one of the most abundant elements on Earth. We use it in fertilizers, feed, toothpaste, detergents, cleaners, and food and drinks. The runoff from rain storms for farms crops and the animal waste (manure) due to the feed used in farm animals keeps building and building until we experience a toxic action in our rivers, streams and lakes. Raw and treated sewage from city treatment plants also have a great effect on phosphorus plants in our rivers, streams and lakes. There were 19 lakes contaminated last year alone in Ohio greatly affects recreational boating, water sports and non-commercial fishing with adverse economic situations. Phosphorus, more



so than nitrogen, is the root of our problem. Heidelberg University measured the phosphorus runoff in July 2010 in the Maumee River. It measured the highest level since 1975 at 261 tons of dissolved phosphorus being carried to Lake Erie. "David Culver... Ohio State Limnology Laboratory said it is clear that phosphorus is over used the world over. ... Basically every body of water in China has big blooms of toxic algae."

In Ohio we are going to try

to reduce the phosphorus effect chemically in Grand Lake St Marys. Last year the EPS tested Grand Lake St Marys and found it to be toxic. The EPA tried several test areas treating them with chemicals to reduce the phosphorous. The results were dismal and most of the test areas failed to eliminate the phosphorus.

On Feb 15th, several CSPS members attended the

COSBC meeting at Cross Creek Campgrounds. Below is some information regarding Alum Creek and Delaware Dam construction. The next COSBC meeting is May 17th at 6pm . Anyone is welcome to attend.

Victor Ricks and Loren Hart (from ODNR) reported there will be a lot of boating facility changes at Alum Creek Lake in 2011 – 2012.

I. Howard Ramp is presently getting a boarding dock installed on the north side of the ramp – Cost \$90,000.

2. New Galena & Hollenback Ramp will be rebuilt – Cost \$2.5 million *Ramps will close from Oct 1, 2011 – July 1, 2012 for construction; *Ramps lanes will be made 15' wide; *Ramp road hump on top will be eliminated.

3. Lake draw down period will be from Sept 15, 2011 – Jan 15, 2012 - *Lake will be drawn down 2" per day to a draw down of 11 feet; *Cheshire Ramp will stay open; *Howard Ramp will stay open until the lake drawdown prevents its use.

4. Alum Creek Power Boat Club public powerboat marina is moving forward - *140 dock facility with 24' & 28' docks; *Some of the dock spaces will have electric; *The park staff will relocate 18 mooring balls for the 2012 boating season.

5. Delaware State Park marina ramp will be rebuilt in 2013 and the traffic pattern will be reversed.

We found that every shift had interested visitors taking literature along with coloring books for the kids (our best handout). This show anecdotally appears to be more valuable in recruiting boaters to our Public Boating Course and perhaps membership in squadron because it was dedicated to boats and RVs with the visitors being either one or the other.

February RV and Vacation Show. Number of Squadron members participating 11 @ 61 hours over 4 days. # of seminars scheduled was 6. # of seminar participants 10 – 15 (est). Due to the higher traffic from this show, the narrower aisles and schedule issues (and lack of participation from Hart Productions) Coastie was not used at this show. This show is much better attended as it offers a much wider range of activities and recreational opportunities. That said the anecdotal evidence with this show reveals actually few contacts and less interest in our Public Boating Course. Clearly this show has reduced the number of participants and vendors as they didn't fill the entire hall as previous shows used both buildings.

Looking forward, we really need feedback to support or refute the attendance conclusions from the two shows. Please ask students at the Public Boating Course where they found out about our course and if it was the shows, specifically which show.

Recommendations:

Review cost vs. return from the Hart Productions show (Feb show)

The back drop from the booth needs to be refurbished with new flannel covering and the interior boards need to be re-drilled with new interconnecting dowels for support.

We need new signs to mount on the back drop that can be supported on their own with Velcro. The current signs are shop worn and in many cases had to be tossed out. The signs that we were able to use were the heavy plastic that had to be supported with duct tape and looked like it! Not a very professional appearance. (This might be the place to spend the Hart Productions money for next year.)

The boat show allowed the co-chairman to contact and visit with a lot of the membership when soliciting help. That

makes this a golden opportunity for relatively new members to assume this assignment, get to know the membership and the workings of the squadron board. We recommend this involvement.

Marketing: Lt Tracy Garrett We could use new backdrops for our signs at the boat shows, including lights, that are easy to set up and light weight for ease of transport.

A new boating brochure is being worked on at this time. Also, the most recent squadron calendar is online.

Commander made a comment that he would like the XO along with his staff to work on a plan to improve our booth.

Marine Spider Control

Most of us have experienced the yearly onslaught of the spider on our vessels. If your vessel remains in the water or in a commercial storage facility during the season, you have no doubt battled the little arachnids on a continual basis. Some years are worse than others, as 2010 will attest. Whereby 2009 was cooler and wetter, 2010, with its hot, dry, humid environment provided an excellent breeding ground for the unwanted little creature. Webs that you just got rid of by washing and cleaning, reappeared in a matter of hours!

Tips for do-it-yourself spider control:

• Always apply pesticides according to label directions. All pesticides that are labeled for spiders also contain a strong warning statement concerning environmental hazards that reads in part "This pesticide is extremely toxic to fish and aquatic invertebrates".

• Apply the pesticide at the first sign of spiders. Once they have established themselves, they are much harder to control. Apply continual treatments throughout the season. No pesticide, regardless of the manufacturer's claims, can stand up to the marine environment for an extended period of time.

• Treat both the dock and the vessel. On the dock, treat utility lines and connections, cleats, between boards, and any crack, crevice or opening which might provide harborage. On the vessel exterior, treat underneath the swim platform, handrail stanchions, vents, anchor lockers, cleats which are used to secure vessel to the dock, and around canvas zippers, flaps, and overhangs. Make sure you treat the exterior electronics, including VHF antenna, radar array, GPS, inside the horn, etc. On sailboats, treat the pulleys along with the other rigging components! If the vessel exterior is properly treated, very little should be needed on the interior. However, if the spiders already have a foothold, interior treatment may be necessary.

Tips on hiring a professional:

• Make sure the company is licensed through The Department of Agriculture and carries sufficient liability insurance.

• Ask about the company's experience in the marine environment. What is their guarantee? Check references!

• Make sure the technician who will be treating your vessel knows their way around boats. Do they wear the appropriate shoes? Do they know how to properly handle canvas? Will they leave your vessel just like they found it?

A reputable and licensed company that provides spider control services generally has access to more effective and more target specific control products than the general public. However, there are not many companies who provide marine spider control, partly because of the environmental liability factor and partly because of the difficulty of control in the marine environment. Make sure that the company and the individual technician you hire has experience in applying pesticides in this difficult environment! We will be covering the VHF DSC marine radio on how to use it, not only for emergency situations, but for everyday communications with our boating friends. Learn how to obtain an MMSI number and then program it into your radio. If you haven't done this, your radio will not send out an emergency alert when you push the red button.

Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacons (EPERB), Personal Locator Beacons (PLB) and Automatic Identification Systems (AIS) will be covered also. Will you be required to own one of these?

Cell and Satellite phones are just a few of the other forms of marine communications that we will be discussing in the nine week course.

Trepidation! Blue Water Boating in Maine

It's only from my local power squadron members that I hear the term "blue water boater." They introduce me that way because I boat (with caution) along the coast of Maine, particularly in Muscongus Bay. Once in Maine, I'm just a plain ol' boater, as almost all boating is "blue water," where the estuaries, bays and Atlantic Ocean are lively with lobster boats, trawlers, waves, tides, and fishermen who know the waters, rocks, islands, and changeable weather like the backs of their hands. These fishing professionals are a hardy, crusty lot who venture out in all seasons. Compared to them, I'm a "chicken" boater who sometimes, when I'm alone, hires one of them for an afternoon to accompany me across the bay for fuel or up the river at season end to dry dock the boat until the following year.

Lobster Buoys - we call them "potties" and they float in rivers, harbors and bays by the thousands, everywhere boaters want to be. Why do they put them there, I asked? Because that's where the lobsters are, I was told. Attached to each pottie is a thick, sturdy line holding onto 12 lobster traps. A non-exploding mine field! Yes, I wrapped a pottie once in a crowded harbor with cliffs and the captain went overboard immediately to cut it off the propeller.

So, it's August 2010; a day of "blue water" boating with Peter, my significant other, and two friends from Columbus to see the puffins on Eastern Egg Rock and the fairy houses on Harbor Island. Peter and I do the preliminary charting on paper the night before and plan to follow our charted course using my auto-marine Garmin GPS.

We rendezvous on the wharf, Peter and I launch the dinghy from the upper dock and row to the Adena, my 23foot Seaway (not SeaRay) with a competent coastal design and semi-displacement hull, powered by a 90hp Suzuki outboard. We cleat the dinghy to the side of the Adena, take her off her mooring and proceed to the dock to load lunch, supplies and our two friends. He's a retired Columbus firefighter and paramedic and his wife is a personal friend of mine. Neither is a boater. And Peter is new to boating, though a very fast study.

Before the Adena departs I give instructions to crew about safety, duties, where to sit, etc.; check systems again; get the dinghy ready; then leave the dock and weave around lobster and pleasure boats, lobster buoys, proceeding out of the harbor to the St. George River and Muscongus Bay. Peter takes the helm when we pass the "no wake" buoy. I cleat the dinghy onto its bridle, letting out enough line so that it rides two waves behind the Adena. The GPS in marine mode makes following our course easy.

We motor around Gay Island, cut into Gay Cove (a sightseeing diversion to show guests the oceanfront ledges on the land I own on the island), then proceed out of the cove to green can C3 and set our course for 248m for about 5nm. Just pass Franklin Light we are to alter course to 202m for 2nm to come along the western side of Eastern Egg Rock. As we head down bay, Peter holds the course and watches for rocks (we call them "hard water" in Maine) and other obstructions,

like the thousands of potties already mentioned, while I check instruments, verify aids to navigation, watch the dinghy, and make sure potties don't go under the boat. The boat lurches a bit at higher speeds so we slow down to keep things more comfortable. (Later investigation told me that I didn't have the engine all the way down, hence the lurching.)

We pass Franklin Light and a host of other small islands, which all look about the same from water level, but the GPS identifies most of them. Finally, Eastern Egg Rock looms on our port side and we steer as close to shore as we dare to catch a glimpse, if possible, of the puffins in the successful colony established there by Audubon. Landing on the rock is forbidden as puffins are endangered, but it is late enough in the season that we hope to catch a glimpse of the birds, adults and young ones, as they take flight for fishing expeditions.

For those who are unfamiliar with puffins, they are short, stout, black and white, clownish-looking birds with orange feet and colorfully striped "parrot" beaks. They return to the same nesting site year after year and, otherwise, live alone at sea. They bob around in the mid Atlantic all winter, diving and fishing as needed. They return to shore only to mate and raise a solitary chick, somehow finding their life partner amid the squalor of thousands of other birds, puffins and other species alike. They dig an underground burrow, hence are not all that visible except for when they fly off to fish in the ocean. They can return with up to 30 fish at a time in their beaks.

I take the helm as we circle Eastern Egg Rock, as the head waves and currents are tricky where the Atlantic tumbles over itself and crashes into the undefined boundaries of the bay and the shelf of the little island. I remember my instructions from power squadron classes: take these waves at 45 degrees; don't get caught broadside. All goes well and we circle Eastern Egg Rock three times. On the eastern side, I spot a puffin taking off from the water and shout to the others. But it's like seeing a shooting star. By the time you tell someone, it's gone. No one else sees it and they settle for spotting a few dolphins and telling me I saw an imaginary puffin. (Could it be jealousy among the surly crew!)

We follow our pre-plotted course back up the bay to the cove of Harbor Island, anchor to enjoy a leisurely late lunch, then row ashore. We hike around to find the fairy houses, many of which have been destroyed by winter storms. Last time I was there, there were well over a hundred. This time, we only find twenty or so. Still, they are engaging. No, I can't tell you about them. It's one of the secrets of Maine – you must go there and discover them for yourself.

Back on the Adena, we haul anchor and motor out of the cove. We get in open water when IT HAPPENS! The GPS stops functioning! The boat bobs around, changing directions, while we try to solve the GPS problem, but we get no results. And there is not an aid to navigation in sight.



The islands are low-lying green lumps just above the water, fairly indistinguishable to all but the seasoned lobstermen. We have the boat's compass, of course, charts and binoculars. But where are we? Our iPhones can't pick up a signal this far from shore. If they could, we'd know our exact longitude and latitude quickly.

As captain, I pull out the chart and start giving instructions. My fireman's job is to use the binoculars to scan the horizon and find an aid to navigation, any aid to navigation. My helmsman's job is to make sure we don't hit any other boats, any rocks, land, potties or anything else while we find out where we are. My friend's job is to be calm and supportive and scout the horizon through a weaker pair of binoculars. My job also is not to look too worried. I've been in worse situations than this as a first mate, but this time, I'm the captain. Hope I'm up to the job! I assure myself that there's always the dinghy, the VHF radio and distress calls to boaters and the Coast Guard, but I hope never to use them in a situation like this. It seems like forever, but we finally sight what appears to be a "can" in the distance and head for it to read the number up close. My fireman finally gets a good reading; I refer to the chart, and bingo! We know where we are. I chart a course back to Gay Island and Pleasant Point Gut. We follow our chart, compass, cans and nuns home to the dock to drop off our friends, then to the mooring. One final row brings Peter and me to the dock, tired, safe and happy. We haul the dinghy to the upper dock, secure it, and head off for dinner with wine, grateful for knowing alternative ways to navigate. Thanks, CSPS and the wonderful instructors.

P.S. What caused the GPS to fail? A corroded electrical contact; hence little recharging of the GPS from the boat's power. We hadn't noticed, but we'd been running on battery power most of the day. We tried to clean contacts, with no luck, on the water. A thorough cleaning of contacts back at the dock solved the problem. A salt water environment is very corrosive.

A HISTORY LESSON


