

It is hard to believe that it is September already and the boating season is winding down. I hope all of you had a summer filled with lots of safe and pleasant boating activities. It has been a very challenging boating season for many of us as Mother Nature has not been the most cooperative with weather through these summer months. On our home lake at Lake Cumberland in July alone we experienced 12" of rain



and a tornado! Looking back over the season, my husband Bill and I experienced either first hand or heard about many mishaps at our marina, Grider Hill. This summer I personally saved an older gentleman from drowning at the dock. He had fallen overboard while unloading his gear from his fishing boat with no life vest on (nor on his boat) and fully clothed down to shoes. The water was close to 100' deep. I was walking my dog Onyx, on this remote area of dock and had to make some very quick decisions to save this person's life as he had been struggling for quite a while to pull himself out of the water. In the end all was well. I was able, with help, to get this person back in the boat. But I did determine at that point that no matter how long you have been boating, how much training you have had, at the moment there is an emergency, you cannot panic. You must think clearly and pray that all the classes, training and experience you have had helps you formulate a successful plan.

So when I was deciding about the subject I wanted to

write about this month, an article that was written a couple of years ago by Bill stuck out in the back of my head. So I decided to resurrect this article.

Boating Safety – WHAT WOULD YOU DO? (B.S. – WWYD)

We all experience either first hand or hear about the mishaps, little and large that happen on the water. Being a member in the United States Power Squadrons means we should all be trained, ready and willing to always do the right thing in an emergency. We are kind of like the Boy Scouts, always prepared.

I would like to bring up an incident that happened this summer that caused me to pause and think; What would I have done in these instances?

B.S. – WWYD Setting: Lake Cumberland at Midnight. On a moonless night a 30' Gibson with two couples aboard left 76 Falls to travel the 4 miles back to their dock at Grider Hill Marina. They had spent the afternoon tied up with other people enjoying boating fellowship. At midnight the captain and boat owner secured his crew and started the 30 minute trip back to the dock. Many boats were making for home, so the narrow channels were somewhat treacherous to navigate given the visability and the boat traffic. Some time during the trip, one of his passengers felt ill and decided to go out back for some air. Once they reached the slow zone at Grider Hill Marina, the captain made the shocking realization she was no longer on board and it was very likely she was not wearing a PFD.

Any of you familiar with Lake Cumberland and it's remoteness, know that the lake is pitch black at night. There — continued on page 4

6. The poster will be judged for the idea presented more than artistic ability.

Squadrons[®], which reserves the right to display or use the submission for future reproduction.

8. Entries do not have to be squadron members only. Great way to get your grandkids, classrooms, others involved in boating safety by creating a poster.

are no shore lights and certainly no Aids to Navigation on the lake. Also it is customary for the locals to ignore the common sense of running only idle speed after dusk. It is not uncommon to hear boats running on plane (or faster) guided only by GPS in the middle of the night.

So, What Would You Do in this situation? There are many instances where a captain's concentration is completely on piloting the boat. A crew member could easily go overboard without being noticed. Our training encourages us to practice man-over-board drills; quickly assign a crew member to point to the man over board, throw a ring as soon as possible, navigate back to the person keeping wind and current in mind. Hmm, I am not sure any of this applies in this situation...

So, what did our captain do? He turned around and started back tracking his route to the the departure point. He lacked a high powered light, so they stopped the boat every few hundred feet turned off the engine and called out her name, listening and hoping to hear a reply. Thankfully after two grueling hours they finally heard a voice call out "I am over here!" The woman-over-board had cleared the boat when waves tossed her overboard and landed very surprised in the black waters. Not able to see the shoreline, but realizing that other boats would be coming, she quickly started to swim. Luckily, she guessed right and reached a rocky shore to await rescue.

So as you pick apart this real life story for all the things our captain did right and wrong, think about Boating Safety – What Would You Do?

After my experience this summer, it only reinforced my commitment to the United States Power Squadrons and our local organizations, the importance of teching boating safety and the continuing boating education, through classes and seminar, that we as members need to participate in.

The Adopt-A-Highway project is coming along. Within the next few months, we hope to have our name printed on a permanent sign along a section of highway in Delaware County. Visit marine police, dock masters, harbormasters, 8. launch operators and PV (Program Visitor) to introduce them to American's Boating Course[®]. Leave promotional materials with them.

9. Create an opportunity to talk about America's Boating Course[®] by wearing United States Power Squadrons[®] apparel, flying your ensign or placing magnets on your vehicles.

10. Teach America's Boating Course[®] at your high school or community college.

LAST HORIZON

Dr. Samuel "Skip" Amos Woodruff, Jr., died June 14, 2015 at The Sanctuary at Tuttle Crossing in Dublin, OH after a long illness. He was 74. Skip was a devoted husband, father, grandfather, brother, and friend who will be missed by all who knew him.

Skip was born March 18, 1941 in Elizabethton, TN to Samuel Amos Woodruff, Sr. and Melba (Daley) Woodruff, as the oldest of three children. The family moved to Columbus, OH in the mid-1940s, where he would live the rest of his life committed to his family, church, and community.

A natural leader, Skip approached all things with grace, determination, and love of life. He became an Eagle Scout at age 17. As a young man, he traveled to Europe with his mother, a foreign language professor at The Ohio State University, numerous times. There he learned to love France and the French culture, and furthered some of his Scouting adventures. Skip was a proud graduate of University School in 1959, where he was a star athlete, lead performer in the school's theater program, and student body president.

He married Susan ("Sudie") Davis, his high school sweetheart, on September 7, 1963. He went on to graduate from The Ohio State University's College of Dentistry in 1967. Skip and Sudie worked together for 48 years, establishing a successful dental practice in Worthington, OH. In 1975, he was awarded "Boss of the Year" award from The Columbus Dental Assistant's Society, and his practice was awarded the Green Jersey Award for outstanding business development from Mercer Advisors in 2008.

Skip's interests were numerous and varied. A Hidden Benefit From a Great Course



I realized a hidden benefit that I thought I should share from taking the Squadron's Engine Maintenance course. Sure a boat owner can save a lot of money by performing their own maintenance and basic repairs if they apply what they learn in the course. Among other benefits are the engine and systems knowledge gained to help diagnose problems and prevent them. Even if one doesn't want to perform their own work, the knowledge is a huge benefit while talking to a marine service department. For me it was a confidence builder that empowered me to successfully perform work on my both of my boats such as water impellers, annual maintenance, and more service that I would not have otherwise attempted. A recent steering repair led me to realize another hidden benefit.

I, along with daughter Devoni, son Nate and Nate's friend Matt were scheduled to leave for Canada with the bass boat in tow July I I th for a fishing trip. I discovered the steering cylinder was leaking fluid just days before the Friday we was scheduled to leave. I confirmed the leaking steering cylinder as a "no go" item. After several failed attempts to find local parts in stock and unable to get into any dealers' service department I was in a panic. All the shops I called were booking two weeks out and none stocked the parts locally. I have never worked on hydraulic anything before. And of course since it is on a boat, it is expensive and mystical, right? Is this a repair or replacement?

Get the parts and call Michael Hughes I decided. Not only is P/C Hughes, IN a great friend who can fix seemingly anything, he is the Engine Maintenance course instructor. He said to call him if I got stuck. Keeping the story short, I get my head on straight and order the cylinder, new fluid, and the rebuild kit from West Marine online with next day freight. Parts arrived, Michael was on standby and finally my blood pressure was starting to lower. The final outcome is I rebuilt the cylinder in about 45 minutes Wednesday evening with Nate and Matt who were both eager helpers. It was a two person job to drain and re-fill the system. I saved about \$750 - but what was the hidden benefit? It was that I controlled the repair schedule. I did it on my time and didn't fall to the dealer's repair schedule. Not to mention I saved my vacation and a lot of money. Noteworthy is West Marine accepts returns at their store even if items were purchased on their web site. I was able to return the \$600 part in Dublin which I never opened and didn't need since the \$97 re-build kit worked.
